continued to register gains against the US dollar for the third against the US dollar for the third consecutive session in the in-terbank market on Tuesday— as the market remained stable after the government's surety of tackling the uphill economic task. The dollar started losing ground on Friday after the rupee plunged for 10 straight rupee plunged for 10 straight sessions during the last days of July — and depreciated around 5% just last week. At the close of Tuesday's interbank trade, the rupee registered another meagre gain of Rs0.46 or 0.19% and reached 238.38, up from 238.84 in the last trading session. Meanwhile the cursession. The local unit — which is currently ranked among the worst performing currencies globally — took a battering in July in the interbank and open markets. Big Tech should share Europe network costs, France, Italy and Spain say

MILAN: France, Italy and Spain are stepping up pres-sure on the European Com-mission to come up with legislation that ensures Big Tech firms partly finance tel Tech firms partly finance tele-coms infrastructure in the bloc, a document showed on Monday. This was the first time the three governments have expressed their joint po-sition on the issue. EU regula-tors said in May they were analysing the question of whether tech giants Alpha-bet's (GOOGLO) Google, Meta and Netflix (NFLX-O) should shoulder some of the costs of shoulder some of the costs of shoulder some of the costs of upgrading telecoms networks. In a joint paper, a copy of which was seen by Reuters, the three governments said the six largest content providers accounted for 55% of internet traffic. "This gener-ates specific costs for Euro-pean referom operators in page 100 per pean telecom operators in pean telecom operators in terms of capacity, at a time they are already hugely invest-ing in the most costly parts of the networks with 5G and Fiber-To-The-Home," the doc-ument said. "We call for a legislative proposal... ensuring all market players contribute to digital infrastructure costs;" the doc-ument said. Taiwan is home to the world's biggest manufacturer of semiconductors on turer of semiconductors on contract, Taiwan Semiconductor Manufacturing Co Ltd (TSMC) (2330.TW). Taiwan tensions mount croelectronics Corp (UMC) (2303.TW) fell 3%. Taiwanese stocks (.TWII) dropped 1.6%, marking their biggest percent-age decline in three weeks, while stocks in China posted their biggest fall in more than their olggest fail in more track two months as mounting ten-sions unsettled Asian financial markets. "The outlook for trade in Asia is likely to weigh on semiconductors, given how much of the world's global production comes from Tai-wan," said Michael Hewson, chief markets analyst at CMC Markets UK. Semiconductor stocks globally felt the heat. Germany's Infineon (IFXGn.DE) declined 2.3%, while Dutch firms ASML (ASMLAS), ASMI (ASMLAS) and BESI (BESI.AS) fell be-tween 3% and 4%.

Itai Avneri, deputy CEO at cryptocurrency trad-ing platform INX, described July's convergence as "good news". "It means institutional investors are looking at bit-coin like any other asset," he said. "When the market turns and it will turn - these institutions will come back and invest in crypto." Gains were not limited to bitcoin, as the value of the global cryptocurrency market crept back above \$1.15 trillion last month, adding over \$255 bil-lion since the end of June, CoinGecko data showed. Assets under management in digital asset investment products rose 16.9% to \$25.9 billion in July, reversing June's decline of 36.8%, according to research firm CryptoCompare.

Avman al-Zawahiri: from Cairo physician to al Qaeda leader

Physician to a (Reuters) - Ayman al-Zawahiri succeeded Osama bin Laden as al Qaeda leader after years as its main organiser and strategist, but his lack of charisma and competition from rival militants Islamic State hobbled his ability to inspire sizeable attacks on the West. Zawahiri, 71, was killed in a U.S. drone strike, U.S. President Joe Biden said on live television on Monday evening. U.S. officials said the attack took place on Sunday in the Afghan capital Kabul. In the years following bin Laden's death in 2011, U.S. air strikes killed a succession of Zawahiri's deputies, cession of Zawahiri's deputies, weakening the veteran Egypt-ian militant's ability to coordi-

nate globally. He had watched as al Qaeda was effectively sidelined by the 2011 Arab revolts launched mainly by middle-class activists and intellectuals opposed to decades of autoc racy. Despite a reputation as an inflexible and combative personality, Zawahiri managed to nurture loosely affiliated groups around the world that grew to wage devastating insurgencies some of them rooted in turmoil arising from the Arab Spring. The violence destabilised a number of countries across Asia, Africa and the Middle East

Speaking on the condition of anonymity, the oficial provided the following details on the operation: * For several years, the U.S. government had been aware of a network that it assessed supported Zawahini, and over the past year, following the United States.

Beyonce to remove offensive lyric after disabled community outcry

LOS ANGELES - Beyonce will remove a derogatory term for disabled people from her new song "Heated," a spokesperson said Monday, after its use was condemned as offensive by campaigners. The US pop megastar will re-record the track from heaters above.

lyrics "Spazzin on that ass, spazz on that ass." "The word, not used intentionally in a harmful way, will be replaced," a spokesperson for Beyonce told AFP via email. Co-written with Canadian rapper Drake, the dance track appears to use the word "spaz" in the collo-



quial sense of temporarily los-ing control or acting erratically. But disability campaigners noted that the word is derived from "spastic." According to the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention, spasticity is a move-ment disorder involving stiff muscles and awkward move-ment, suffered by 80 percent of people with cerebral palsy. In June, US singer Lizzor-recorded her song "Grrfs" to remove the same term following complaints that it was derogatory. In an In-stagram post published soon after the album s release, Bey-once said creating the album Centers for Disease Control and once said creating the album "allowed me a place to dream and to find escape during a scary time for the world.
