IHC reserves verdict on plea against Shireen Mazari's alleged arrest



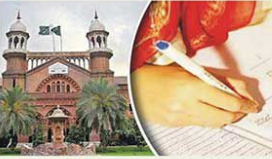

The Islamabad High Court has reserved its verdict on a petition against the alleged arrest/kidnapping of former federal minister Dr Shireen Mazari. Justice Mohsin Akhtar Kayani presided over Tuesday's hearing. Advocate Faisal Chaudhry appeared before the court on behalf of the petitioner, advocate Iman Mazari, while Additional Attorney General Manoor Iqbal Dogal represented the federation.

At the outset of the proceedings, the court questioned the Anti-Corruption Establishment (ACE) authorities if their team had come to arrest Shireen Mazari. The ACE officials responded in the affirmative, saying that they came to arrest on May 21, 2022 and they had put Shireen Mazari on notice after registering the FIR. They told the court that the deputy commissioner had been informed beforehand and that they were accompanied by the personnel of the Kotsar Police Station.

LHC orders action against Nikah registrar in underage marriage case

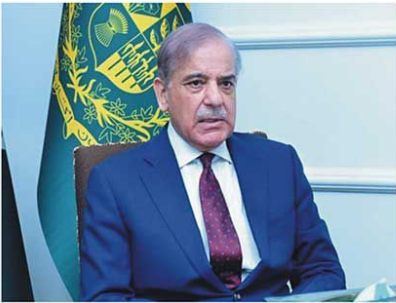
The Lahore High Court on Tuesday ordered action against Nikah registrar for arranging the marriage of an underage girl.

Justice Anwarul Haq Pannu heard the petition filed by Humaira Bibi, who brought the young girl from a shelter home and presented her in court. The petitioner stated that the girl, 15, was forced into marriage, with a case of abduction registered at Shahdara police station. Justice Pannu asked the girl if she married of her own choice, to which she responded, yes.

When asked about her age, the girl stated she was between 15 to 16 years old. Justice Pannu blamed the Nikah Khawan, questioning how they facilitated the marriage of such a young girl.

All state enterprises except strategic entities to be privatised: PM Shahbaz

Loss-making SOEs to be privatised on priority basis, says Shehbaz Sharif

Pakistan will privatise all state-owned enterprises, with the exception of strategic entities, Prime Minister Shehbaz Sharif announced on Tuesday, broadening its initial plans to take only loss-making state firms private. The premier chaired a review meeting and green-lighted privatisation of profitable and loss-making SOEs. Shehbaz directed all federal ministries to take necessary action in this regard and cooperate with the Privatisation Commission, adding that the move aimed at ensuring a business and investment-friendly environment. Directing concerned authorities

to ensure transparency, the premier ordered to televise the privatisation process of Pakistan International Airlines (PIA), including the bidding. Following the premier's instructions, the privatisation process of other institutions will also be broadcast live. A roadmap of the Privatisation Programme 2024-2029 was presented during the meeting and the ministers were informed about the progress made so far for the privatisation of SOEs. It was informed that the pre-qualification process for PIA's privatisation will be completed by the end of the month and that the privatisation of power distribution companies has also been included in the programme.

It was noted that loss-making SOEs were to be privatised on a priority basis and that a pre-qualified panel of experts is being appointed in the Privatisation Commission to speed up the sell-off process. On Sunday, Finance Minister Mubhammad Aurangzeb dismissed the concept of 'strategic SOEs' advocating for a broad privatisation strategy and reiterating the government's commitment to tax retailers. Aurangzeb's statements came during a pre-budget conference in Lahore, following Deputy Prime Minister Ishaq Dar's announcement that the PML-N government would narrow its business scope to strategic and essential SOEs.

Govt denies impression of interference in judicial affairs

Federal Law Minister Azam Naveez Tatar says the content of Justice Babar Sattar's letter wrongly gives the impression that institutions interfere in the judiciary's affairs. Federal Minister Tatar, along with Federal Information Minister Atta Tatar, said Attorney General for Pakistan Mansoor Awan also made it clear that there was no interference in the affairs of the judiciary. They said the matter of the six judges' letter to the Supreme Judicial Council was sub-judice.

They said today there was a lot of discussion regarding TV, newspapers, media and social media regulator. A draft came to the cabinet for approval and some guidelines were given which are according to the constitution of Pakistan. Azam Naveez Tatar further said Pakistan needed unity to challenge the economic crisis. Atta Tatar said if someone had dual citizenship, he had to declare it. "This one issue should not be raised as a national security issue through letters. The court was only asked for an in-camera briefing," he said. Meanwhile, Attorney General for Pakistan Mansoor Awan said nowadays the impression was being given that the relationship between the judiciary and the executive was not good. The AGP denied it. He said the letter by the judge was misconstrued.

Justice Babar Sattar highlights 'interference' in audio leak case

Islamabad High Court's (IHC) Justice Babar Sattar has pointed out alleged interference by Establishment in judicial affairs.

Justice Sattar has penned a letter to IHC Chief Justice Aamer Farooq, informing him that he was asked to back off from the audio leak case.

The case is related to the petitions filed by the PTI founder's wife Bushra Bibi and Najam Saqib, son of former chief justice of Pakistan (CJP) Saqib Nisar, last year against the audio leaks.

In the letter, the IHC Justice also gave reference to the case and noted: "... the Court has put on notice the heads of intelligence and investigation agencies, including ISI, IB and FIA, apart from relevant Ministries of the Federal Government and



statutory regulations such as PTA and PEMRA".

"The question before the court is whether there exists a legal regime permitting surveillance of citizens," he wrote.

Justice Sattar added that at some point during the hearing of the case, "I was delivered messages on behalf of top officials in the security establishment asking me to back off from extensive scrutiny of the existence and mode of surveillance".

The high court judge further said he paid no heed to such intimidatory tactics and did not find that such messages created a risk of substantial detriment to the administration of justice.

Maryam wants all RO plants in Punjab functional, new ones in areas with brackish water

CM calls for a comprehensive plan for supply of clean drinking water in every Punjab area

Punjab Chief Minister Maryam Nawaz has issued instructions for making all inactive and damaged water filtration plants functional. The chief minister passed this order while chairing a meeting regarding the Aab Pak Authority here on Tuesday.

During the meeting, a report was presented on the status of 5,027 water filtration plants installed

across Punjab.

The chief minister called for a comprehensive plan for the supply of clean drinking water in every area, and ordered the immediate activation of inactive and damaged reverse osmosis (RO) plants across the province. She also issued directives for the installation of new water filtration plants on a priority basis in areas with brackish water.

During the meeting, the CM directed the relevant authorities to utilise all-out resources to provide clean drinking water to citizens.

It was also decided in principle to entrust the management of all water filtration plants to a single authority.

The meeting was attended by Senator Pervez Rashid, provincial minister Maryam Aurangzeb and others.

IHC bars authorities from blocking SIMs till May 27

The Islamabad High Court (IHC) on Tuesday stopped the authorities concerned from blocking SIMs of non-filers.

IHC Chief Justice Aamer Farooq heard the petition of a telecom company which questioned the rationale behind the Federal Board of Revenue insistence on blocking SIMs of non-filers.

Advocate Salman Akram Raja appeared as a counsel for the company and argued that the move to block SIMs was in contravention of

Article 18 of the constitution. He said the blockage of more than 500,000 SIMs meant Rs1 billion annual loss.

The court stopped the authorities from blocking SIMs and issued a stay order till May 27. The court sought a reply from the respondents.

Agreement on SIMs' blockage Earlier, the Pakistan Telecommunication Authority (PTA) agreed to block SIMs of non-filers after deliberations with the Federal Board of Revenue (FBR).

The PTA and telecom companies agreed to block the SIMs of 5,000 non-filers every day.

The development came as the Federal Board of Revenue (FBR) held negotiations with the PTA and telecom companies. The FBR officials had a meeting with PTA and telecom operators for implementation of the Income Tax General Order. The purpose of the meetings was to ensure blocking of mobile SIMs of non-

The motivations driving Saudi Arabia and the UAE to step into the role of mediators in the India-Pakistan conflict are multifaceted and rooted in both regional geopolitics and historical dynamics. Pakistan reciprocates by sending a significant portion of its workforce, numbering 12.4 million overseas workers, predominantly to these Gulf States. These workers, constituting over 77% of nearly 830,000 who ventured abroad for employment in 2022, contribute substantially to Pakistan's economy through remittances. The relationship between Pakistan and Saudi Arabia extends beyond

economics to encompass strategic and security dimensions. Pakistan played a pivotal role in training "holy warriors" alongside Saudi Arabia and the US to combat the Soviet Union's presence in Afghanistan following its occupation in 1979. Furthermore, during the Iran-Iraq war in the 1980s, Pakistan stationed tens of thousands of troops in Saudi Arabia. Military collaboration, including training and arms exports, has been a consistent feature of Pakistan's engagement with Saudi Arabia and the UAE. Commissioner to activate closed filtration plants in the city

Soon Times Correspondent Sargodha: Commissioner Sargodha Division Muhammad Ajmal Bhatti has urged for a plan within a week to run the non active water filtration plants in the Sargodha city on a permanent basis. He issued these directions in the briefing session of Punjab Council of Research of Water Resources (PCRWR) in the conference room of his office on Tuesday. The meeting was also attended among others by Deputy Commissioner Captain Retired Aurangzeb Haider Khan.

Superintending Engineer of Public Health Engineering Department, Director Development and other concerned officers. In the briefing, it was informed that Sargodha city receives about 550 mm of rain annually and this rain water can be harvested from various sources and used for agriculture and domestic use. It was further stated that adding rainwater to the ground water through modern means can help bring up the saline water in areas where the ground water is very low. Under this project, water can be reserved by building wells in areas of the city where

rainwater accumulates in large quantities. It was further informed that by keeping small tanks in government offices and educational institutions, the rain water can be used for vegetation and other similar purposes. The briefing revealed that the cost of this project will be very low. The commissioner emphasized the need for the PCRWR to take steps to construct such ponds at four different locations in the city on a trial basis. "If successful, its scope will be extended to more low-lying areas," he added.



We won't accept rude, arrogant behaviour of anyone: Asad Qaiser

The National Assembly session started with Speaker Ayaz Sadiq in chair. Pakistan Tehreek-e-Insaf leader Asad Qaiser, in his address, said the way Khawaja Asif spoke to the speaker yesterday (Monday) was condemnable. He said Khawaja Asif was an elderly person 80 years of age. Being a senior parliamentarian he should realise this and show tolerance, said Qaiser. Speaking about erstwhile FATA, Qaiser said all parties in parliament had unanimously given tax exemption to FATA and this facility was meant to bring them on a par with other areas of the country. But, regrettably, they were deprived of basic rights, he said and added, FATA had been a war-torn area. No hospital or college had been established there so far. No development work was done in the

"In such a situation, how can they be equal to other areas and now if tax is imposed on them, it will be an unjust step," said Qaiser. "It is said that people of these areas do not pay taxes. I have all the data with me. About Rs70 billion are being collected from FATA as taxes," the PTI leader claimed. The PTI leader appealed to the speaker to form a committee on the matter including representatives from FATA. Omar Ayub Leader of the Opposition in the National Assembly Omar Ayub, while reacting to

Khawaja Asif's statement, said Asif used indecent language and unethical words while talking about his grandfather and his family. "He has not studied history correctly. Attorney general denies allegations of any interference in judiciary

Soon Times Correspondent ISLAMABAD Attorney General for Pakistan (AGP) Mansoor Usman Awan in a rare press talk on Tuesday refuted allegations of the government or any other state institution interfering in judicial matters.



Awan's remarks came shortly after the IHC began hearing two contempt pleas pertaining to the character assassination of IHC's Justice Mohsin Akhtar Kayani on social media and the leaking of Justice Babar Sattar's personal details. Awan maintained that it is necessary to issue clarification as the matter of the IHC judges' letter is being presented in a manner that implies a growing conflict between the executive and the judiciary. "It was requested to hear surveillance-related matters in-camera, to ensure the matter does not go into the public domain in order to protect the capabilities of our security and intelligence agencies," the AGP maintained, adding that this was communicated to the relevant quarters. He clarified that the office of the AGP and the AAG acts as a "bridge" to facilitate communication. "Neither the government or any state institution can meddle in the affairs of the judiciary and I strongly deny any such impression." "According to my information, no officer of any security establishment has contacted or can contact [any member of the judiciary]. And the contact that was made, was done through the AGP's office

to ensure sensitive information was not made public." Earlier in March, six judges of the Islamabad High Court (IHC) reached out to the Supreme Judicial Council (SJC) seeking clarity on the alleged intrusion of executive members, including intelligence operatives, in the judicial matters. Six judges of the IHC—Justice Mohsin Akhtar Kiyani, Justice Tariq Mehmood Jahangiri, Justice Babar Sattar, Justice Sardar Ejaz Ishaq Khan, Justice Arbab Muhammad Tahir and Justice Saman Rafiq Imtiaz—penned a letter to the SJC led by Chief Justice Qazi Faez Isa, expressing concerns about the "interference" of intelligence agencies in the affairs of the courts.

"We, therefore, request that a judicial convention be called to consider the matter of interference of intelligence operatives with judicial functions and/or intimidation of judges in a manner that undermines the independence of the



SC allows video-link facility for PTI founder in NAB amendment case

Soon Times Correspondent ISLAMABAD The Supreme Court of Pakistan on Tuesday allowed video-link facility for the Pakistan Tehreek-e-Insaf (PTI) founder in the National Accountability (NAB) Ordinance 1999 amendment case. "The PTI founder can present his arguments in the upcoming hearing via video link if he wishes to do so [...]. arrangements should be made for presentation of arguments via video link," Chief Justice of Pakistan Qazi Faez Isa said. He said so during the hearing of the federal government's intra-court appeal filed against the apex court's 2023 verdict which annulled some of the NAB amendments. The bench includes Justice Aminuddin Khan, Justice Jamal Khan Mandokhel, Justice Athar Minallah and Justice Hasan Azhar Rizvi. It may be recalled that the PTI founder had challenged the amendments made to the National Accountability Ordinance (NAO) 1999 by the PDM government. Then chief justice Umar Ata Bandial-led bench ordered restoring all graft cases worth less than Rs500 million that were closed down against the

political leaders belonging to the ruling coalition parties and public office-holders. The government government challenged the verdict of Justice Bandial and the PTI founder wanted to present his arguments in the case. TODAY'S PROCEEDINGS At the outset of the hearing, a letter by the PTI founder was presented before the court in which he had prayed the court to allow him to present his arguments in person. The Chief Justice said that according to the letter, the PTI founder wanted to appear before the court in person. Justice Jamal Mandokhel said that he [PTI founder] has to decide whether he wanted to appear in person or through a lawyer. Justice Athar Minallah remarked that if the PTI founder wanted to appear in person he should be brought here. He was a party to this case, how can we deny him the right to appear before the court. This is a case regarding NAB and it is his right to appear in person. CJP Isa observed that this is a constitutional matter and not a case of personal rights. We have to see how can a person who is not even a lawyer help us? Our order was that he could present arguments through his counsel!

Russian president Putin to make a state visit to China this week

Russian President Vladimir Putin will make a two-day state visit to China this week, the Chinese Foreign Ministry said Tuesday, in the latest show of unity between the two authoritarian allies against the U.S.-led Western liberal global order.

Putin will meet Chinese leader Xi Jinping during his visit starting on Thursday, the ministry said, saying the two leaders would discuss "cooperation in various fields of bilateral relations... as well as international and regional issues of common concern." No details were mentioned.

The Kremlin in a statement confirmed the trip and said Putin was going on Xi's invitation. It said that this will be Putin's first foreign trip since he was sworn in as president and began his fifth term in office.



New Caledonia deploys more police as 'streets on fire' over

Authorities in the French-ruled Pacific island of New Caledonia sent more police onto the streets, shut the international airport and imposed a curfew in the capital after protesters over the territory's voting system turned violent.

New Caledonia's capital Noumea was covered by a thick cloud of black smoke as night fell and the curfew started, local broadcaster NC La here reported, adding that a local sport facility had been set ablaze. The previous night, rioters burnt cars, supermarkets, clashed with police and set up barricades with tensions focused on plans to allow more people to take part in elections in New Caledonia, which indigenous Kanak protesters reject.



Palestinians mark 76 years of dispossession as a potentially even larger catastrophe unfolds in Gaza

Palestinians on Wednesday will mark the 76th year of their mass expulsion from what is now Israel, an event that is at the core of their national struggle. But in many ways, that experience pales in comparison to the calamity now unfolding in Gaza.

Palestinians refer to it as the Nakba, Arabic for catastrophe. Some 700,000 Palestinians—a majority of the prewar population—fled or were driven from their homes before and during the 1948 Arab-Israeli war that followed Israel's establishment. After the war, Israel refused to allow them to return because it would have resulted in a Palestinian majority within its borders. Instead, they became a seemingly permanent refugee community that now numbers some 6 million, with most living in slum-like urban refugee camps in Lebanon, Syria, Jordan and the Israeli-occupied West Bank.

In Gaza, the refugees and their descendants make up around three-quarters of the population. Israel's rejection of what Palestinians say is their right of return has been a core grievance in the conflict and was one of the thorniest issues in peace talks that last collapsed 15 years ago. The refugee camps have always been the main bastions of Palestinian militancy. Now, many Palestinians fear a repeat of their painful history on an even more cataclysmic scale.

All across Gaza, Palestinians in recent days have been loading up cars and donkey carts or setting out on foot to already overcrowded tent camps as Israel expands its offensive. The images from several rounds of mass evacuations throughout the seven-month war are strikingly similar to black-and-white photographs from 1948. Mustafa al-Gazzar, now 81, still recalls his family's monthlong flight from their village in what is now central Israel to the southern city of Rafah, when he was 5. At one point they were bombed from the air, at another, they dug holes under a tree to sleep in for warmth.

Poland to boost intelligence spending due to Russian threat

Poland will allocate an additional 100 million zlotys (\$25.30 million) to boost its intelligence services, Prime Minister Donald Tusk said on Tuesday, as he warned of a rising threat from Russia.

Poland says its place as a distribution hub for supplies to Ukraine has made it a key target for Moscow's intelligence services, fears that were exacerbated last week when a judge who had access to military secrets defected to Russian ally Belarus. "I decided to allocate 100 million zlotys from my reserve, the reserve of the prime minister, to strengthen the internal security and intelligence agencies," Tusk told a news conference.

He said that Russian efforts to destabilise European countries, particularly Poland and the Baltic states, were set to intensify in the run-up to European elections in June.

"We will have to invest more resources, time, more actions when it comes to our special services," he said. However, he said that there was as yet nothing to indicate that several large fires in Poland in recent days were the work of external forces. Nevertheless, he said that Polish services had prevented several sabotage attempts. "In the last dozen or so weeks, also thanks to the support of our allies, Poland thwarted attempts to commit sabotage and arson," he said. Tusk added that Poland was likely to get EU funds to help strengthen its border with Belarus.

Top US and Chinese officials begin talks on AI in Geneva



GENEVA
Top envoys from the U.S. and China huddled in closed-door talks in Geneva on Tuesday to lay out their national approaches to the promise and perils of emerging artificial intelligence technology.

The talks, which Presidents Joe Biden and Xi Jinping agreed to launch in last 2023, are meant to open up bilateral dialogue between the world's two biggest economies — and increasingly, geopolitical rivals — on a fast-moving technology that already has consequences for trade, lifestyles, culture, politics, national security and defense and much more.

U.S. technology experts say the meeting — led on the American side by high-level White House and State Department officials — could offer a glimpse into Beijing's thinking about AI amid a generally tight-lipped Chinese approach to the technology.

Cofounder Jason Glassberg of Casaba Security in Redmond, Washington, an expert on new and emerging threats posed by AI, handicapped the meeting as a get-to-know-you that will likely yield few concrete results, but get the two sides talking.

"What's most important right now is that both sides realize they each have a lot to lose if AI becomes weaponized or abused," Glassberg said in an e-mail. "All parties involved are equally at risk. Right now, one of the biggest areas of risk is with deepfakes, particularly for use in disinformation campaigns." "This is just as big of a risk for the PRC as it is for the U.S. government," he added, referring to the People's Republic of China.

It was not immediately clear why the meeting was taking place in Geneva, though the internationally-minded Swiss city bills itself as a hub of diplomacy and U.N. and international institutions.

Sabalenka reaches Rome last 16, Djokovic returns after bottle drama

Australian Open champion Aryna Sabalenka cruised into the last 16 of the Rome Open with a straight-sets victory over Dayana Yastremska, 6-4, 6-2.

Second seed Sabalenka claimed her first win in four matches against Ukrainian Yastremska to set up a clash in the next round with either Elena Svitolina, a two-time winner at the Foro Italico, or Anna Kalinskaya. The 26-year-old Belarusian made short work of Yastremska, dispatching her opponent in one hour and 28 minutes without dropping a service

game and never looking in trouble. Sabalenka, who has never won in Rome but is a two-time champion on the Madrid clay, looks in good shape to at least match her 2022 run to the semifinals.

Earlier Maria Sakkari lined up a probable last-16 clash with Victoria Azarenka who faces 80th-ranked Egyptian Mayar Sherif later on Sunday. Novak Djokovic returns to centre court later as he takes on Chile's Alejandro Tabilo on the hunt for a sixth Rome title and a record-extending 11st Masters 1000 crown.

Only captains will be permitted to speak to referees at Euro 2024

Captains will be the only ones allowed to speak to the referee and discuss a decision during matches at the upcoming European Championship in a bid to facilitate clearer communication. UEFA's managing director of refereeing Roberto Rosetti said.

"Being a referee in the modern game is very difficult," Rosetti said in an open letter on Tuesday. "The official in the middle takes between 200 to 250 decisions per match—that is one every 22 seconds—in difficult and sometimes controversial situations, under huge pressure, with each of them scrutinised and re-watched from multiple different angles by fans and pundits alike." "They (referees) receive a lot of information from the Video Assistant Referee (VAR), and we are ready to speak and share more details with the players and coaches to help them understand how a decision was taken." Rosetti said coaches and players have welcomed the new approach. "Explaining a decision with up to 22 players mobbing you is impossible for a referee. It can lead to a breakdown in communication, with the beautiful game turning very ugly very quickly," he added. "We ask that all teams ensure their captain is the only player who speaks to the referee. We ask the captains to ensure their team mates do not encroach upon and surround the referee, allowing direct conversations to take place in order that the decision be relayed in a timely and respectful manner." "Importantly, we want only the captain from the team who wishes to discuss a decision to be able to approach the referee." "If the captain is a goalkeeper, Rosetti said an outfield player will be nominated to communicate with the referee. The quadrennial tournament will be held in Germany from June 14-July 14.

"Early on at Arsenal I knew it was a place for me to grow and challenge myself as a player and a person," Miedema said in a video posted by Arsenal on social media. Miedema earned two WSL golden boots while at Arsenal, and was the top goalscorer in the Women's Champions League during their 2019-20 campaign. "Viv's goals and overall performances as an Arsenal

player have been of the highest quality, and she has created so many wonderful memories for us over the years," Arsenal's sporting director Edu Gaspar said in a statement. The 27-year-old forward struggled with injuries during her last two seasons at Arsenal, suffering an anterior cruciate ligament (ACL) injury in December 2022 that required surgery.
